Welcome to Speech and Debate at Mountain Vista High School! To continue the honorable tradition here at Mountain Vista, our team must exude determination, hard work, and pride. Each individual will be responsible for leading and teaching, as well as learning new techniques and possibly new events.

The coach for the MVHS Speech and Debate team is Shannon Vance. In addition to Vance, we will also have a number of veterans back to help team teach, lead, and guide all members. **Meetings will be held weekly** even if there is not a tournament in the upcoming week; **each member is required to attend meetings** unless he/she has academic reasons (making up a test, assignments, etc.) that would hinder attendance at such. Students should make the coach aware of this ahead of time. Students unable to attend meetings will be under review for participation in upcoming tournaments.

Speech and Debate consists of public speaking events in which students compete against each other on a weekly basis. Mountain Vista categorizes this into three main categories—interpretation events, supplemental events, and debate events. Interpretation events include the interpretation of humorous, dramatic, and poetic literature that is performed in accordance with established rules and in a certain time frame. Debate events include two of the most common forms of high school debate—Lincoln-Douglas Debate and Public Forum Debate, though as a team we also compete in Congressional Debate. Supplemental Events include Original Oratory (a self-written piece that is informative and persuasive), International and National Extemporaneous Speaking, and Student Congress. If a student has questions about a particular event or needs direction, he or she should speak with Mrs. Vance.

FEES for Speech and Debate are similar to other district activities and run \$175 per year. This includes entry fees, supplies and case briefs, academic lettering materials, and National Speech and Debate Association (NSDA) Membership. Accommodations may be made for students who are not able to meet these fees. Fees for overnight trips (if any), and supplies will not be covered and will require additional fees. **The set fee for the 2016 - 17 season is (\$175). You must pay \$87.50 by September 15th and the remainder (\$87.50) by December 1st. Each week failure to meet dues beyond December 1st will result in an additional \$20 per week.** If a student qualifies for the State Tournament and/or decides to attend the National Qualifying, additional fees will be required. Team t-shirts and/or sweatshirts will be an additional cost TBD later in the season. Purchase of a shirt is optional, but strongly encouraged. Novice Tournament fees are separate, smaller charges and will be assessed on your Infinite Campus accounts per tournament as registred.

PRACTICES will begin after school starting Tuesday, August 23rd.. Practices are held Tuesday afternoons from 3:00–5:00 pm in U312. Speech and Debate provides returns based on how hard each participant works. To compete at the highest level, you will need to work individually outside of school or with your debate partner to achieve success. The coach and captains will provide advice, guidance, and support but ultimately your performance is a reflection of your work and time. Mrs. Vance will do her best to meet with students on an individual basis by appointment.

COMPETITIONS are held primarily on Saturdays, usually lasting all day. While there are a number of opportunities for tournaments, students are not required to compete in every tournament scheduled. Sign ups will take place at practice the week before the tournament or on the Speech Veteran page on Facebook. Make sure to sign up early, as there is a limit to the number of teams able to compete. If you sign up for a tournament, you are expected to attend. If you cannot attend for any reason, you **MUST** let Vance know as soon as possible. Dropping a tournament anytime after the tournament “closes” will cost the team, and subsequently, you, a drop fee (\$20). You are responsible for your own transportation to and from the tournaments. Carpooling is encourage. Please communicate with Mrs. Vance over any concerns.

By varying the schedule and giving some time to reflect on events, students and coaches will avoid burnout and perform at a higher level. The novice season begins in October and concludes with the first varsity tournament early in November. The remainder of the tournaments are at the varsity level, and any student expecting to letter must meet the lettering requirements.

Additionally, we may be involved in various fundraising activities throughout the year to either help pay for tournaments/transportation fees. Team members will be encouraged to take an assertive role or may be asked to help out of necessary. We have a booster club to which you may make tax-deductible donations. Please see Mrs. Vance or the Twitter or the Facebook pages for more info.

FOOD: Each week, we can use help with supplying food for tournaments. Since many of the tournaments are all day endeavors, it is important to have an abundance of food and drinks for the competitors. Many food items that can be purchased early and “stockpiled” for the season. Any assistance from families in this area would be greatly appreciated. Costco and Sam’s Club- sized items are perfect! Due to budgetary restrictions, the team will not supply food en masse at tournaments. **Please note, food (meals and snacks) will be available at the tournament through the host school *for purchase by individual students.***

Basic Team Rules

BEHAVIOR: Behavior on the team will reinforce cooperation, learning, and understanding. Students will be expected to follow all school rules and regulations.

- Students who misrepresent the team in any way will be subject to consequences that may include being removed from the team.
- Students will show respect to the coaches, the parent supports, judges, each other, and to other teams.
- Students will support each other. Bullying, teasing, and harassment of any kind will not be tolerated. You don’t have to be best friends, but you must be collegial.

TOURNAMENT ATTENDANCE:

- Sign up for tournaments by the deadline.
- Be on time to tournaments.
- If you are late, you will be required to pay any incurred drop fees.
- Notify Mrs. Vance (720-626-0927) ASAP if you are unable to attend a tournament that you have signed up for. You may have to pay a fee if you drop a tournament if you have already been registered and the deadline to drop has passed.
- DO NOT leave the tournament without permission from a coach.
- DO NOT leave the tournament if ANY team member has broken to any finals rounds. Team members will support any students who “break” and will stay for awards. **DO NOT LEAVE EARLY.**
- ALWAYS be on time to all your rounds.

AWARDS:

- Awards will stay in the display case until the student graduates.
- State and National trophies stay and become school property.

Tournament Rules and Consequences

INAPPROPRIATE BEHAVIOR:

- 1st offense – Conference with coach, call parents, suspension from next tournament (you incur any fees)
- 2nd offense – Call home, referral, *drop from team*.

PLAGIARISM:

- 1st offense – Conference with coach, call parents.
- 2nd offense – Call home, referral, *drop from team*.

VANDALISM/MALICIOUS BEHAVIOR:

- 1st offense – Call parents, send home at student expense, referral and *drop from team*.

DRUG/ALCOHOL VIOLATION:

- 1st offense – Any team member who attends practice, a tournament, etc. under the influence will face suspension/expulsion, and will be dropped from the team.

Remember that your behavior at the tournaments reflects not only on yourself but also on MVHS, the entire speech team, the Douglas County School District, National Speech and Debate Association, and the State of Colorado; therefore, you are expected to represent all of us appropriately and professionally at all times.

DRESS CODE

Speech and Debate competition is one of the most conservative, professional activities in which high school students participate; therefore, the competitors should dress accordingly. Remember you are representing our school and yourself. Please be a positive role model.

GROOMING

Lettering and NSDA Points

LETTERING:

20 Credits will letter.

Credits will be earned by:

1. Attending a Varsity Tournament –1 point
2. Breaking at a Varsity tournament—1 point (per event)
3. Providing a Judge to a Varsity Tournament—3 points (Per tournament)
4. Qualifying for a State and/or National Tournament - 1 point (Per Tournament)
5. Earning 100 NSDA points--2 points (1 point for every 50 after that)
6. Consistent practice attendance (1 point per every 5 practices attended)
7. Fundraising and Special Event participation (if applicable) 1 point per event
8. No final grade lower than a C in any class.



NSDA POINTS:

Points are earned and reported for each round of tournament competition to the national office as follows:

- Debate: 6 for each win, 3 for each loss
- Extemp and Oratory: 6 for first place, 5 for second, 4 for third, 3 for fourth, 2 for fifth or lower
- Interpretation Events: 5 for first, 4 for second, 3 for third, 2 for fourth, 1 for fifth or lower.
- Congress: up to 25 points per day
- Judging: 2 points for each round judged if student has earned a degree of excellence or higher.
